


POPULATION COMPOSITION BY AGE GROUP AND MEDIAN AGE, MALAYSIA, 2014-2016

2015: 27.6 years



(to facilitate the setting up of educational centres)

Community Learning Centres (CLC) by plantation owners in Sabah & sarawak for plantation workers' legal children aged between 7 – 12 years.


- UNHCR with six partner NGOs, 26 operational partners & the refugee communities – run 124 CLCs.



Alternative Learning Centres – non-citizen children – unable to access formal education in Government institutions (rural and urban)

- **HUMANA** (Humana Child Aid Society) children of Indonesian plantation workers in Sabah. 2016 137 HUMANA Learning Centres 10. 436 children.
- UNICEF with local NGO HALUAN (Organisation of Graduates of Educational Institutions, Malaysia provide education for children lack of legal status.
