Port Facilities Open To International Traffic

Our Turkish-owned maritime fleet has grown from 8.9 million DWT to 28.9 million DWT. The number of Coastal Facilities Open to International Ship Traffic increased from 152 to 184.




Total Handling



The amount of cargo handled at our ports increased by 6.1% compared to the same period of the previous year.

Container Handling



The amount of containers handled at our ports increased by 10.6% compared to the same period of the previous year.

A SUSTAINABLE BLUE ECONOMY:


Restores, protects and maintains the diversity, productivity, resilience, core functions, and intrinsic value of marine ecosystems — the natural capital upon which its prosperity depends.





SHIP FINANCE&RENEWAL OF COASTAL FLEET



"The Regulation on the Promotion of the Construction of New Ships to Replace Scrapped Turkish Flag Ships" came into force. We encourage the construction of new ships to replace our scrapped Turkish flagged ships, and we are renewing our coaster fleet.

We give "Scrap Incentive" for our ships over 20 years old...

L Up to 5 ships per year, average per ship 5 million TL incentive,

L Contribution to shipbuilding, ship recycling industry and employment.

GREEN PORT PROJECT



Turkey has initiated the "Green Ports Project" intending to reduce emissions and improve the sustainability of port operations.

Up to now, 20 port facilities have been awarded green port certificates after completion of their audits.


